# A 'potted' history

#### 1903

John and Margaret Nettlefold start building Winterbourne. Both are from well-known Birmingham industrialist families.

#### 1919

The family move on. Two other families enjoy the house and garden as their home.

#### 1944

Owner John Nicolson dies, leaving the house and garden to the University of Birmingham. The University uses the garden for study by the school of Botany and female undergraduates lodge in the house.

#### 1960s

Students move out and University departments move in. The house becomes a centre of Extramural Studies, where a variety of courses are taught.

#### In the 2000s

The garden restoration commences and in 2008 listed status is achieved.

#### 2009

The house refurbishment plan begins and the house opens to the public in 2010. For the first time ever visitors are now able to visit both the house and garden and learn more about the whole site and its history. The house was awarded Museum Accredited in 2017.

### Accessibility

As Winterbourne site is made up of historic listed buildings and a garden it can present some challenges for visitors with mobility issues. We have tried to make the house and gardens as accessible as possible within the framework of an historical site.

# Site safety

In the garden there are areas of uneven ground, steep pathways and open water. Paths can be slippery when wet and some grass areas can be boggy. We want everyone to enjoy their visit but please keep to marked paths if you are unsteady on your feet. We remind all visitors to take care walking around the site and always proceed with caution, especially during inclement weather.
